Continuing Our Growth

Dear friends,

Every year, our Girl Scouts make us proud – and this year is no different. From our Daisy Girl Scouts, who are learning to be entrepreneurs in their first cookie sale program, to our Gold Award Girl Scouts, our girls have had an amazing year!

Thanks to your support, we saw our second consecutive year of growth with 7,624 members. In 2023, we increased our youth membership to a total of 5,397 Girl Scouts, the highest number since the pandemic.

We are rebuilding stronger than ever. This year, the Cookie Sale Entrepreneur program had Girl Scouts in-person selling at booths in all kinds of weather and via order cards. Additionally, Digital Cookie sales remained strong. We finished the program with over three quarters of a million boxes sold. Troops collected funds from their sales to put towards trips, activities and service projects in their communities.

Camps continue to be a highlight for our girls and volunteers, but our camps had a tough year. We saw weather damage at each of our properties and this affected the kind of programming we were able to provide. We hosted over 500 Girl Scouts from around the country at GIRL Fest this year. This high adventure program was the highlight of the year for many of our Girl Scouts.

Our 11 Gold Award Girl Scouts indeed demonstrated why they are girls the world needs. These inspirational young leaders protected the environment, worked on mental healing and completed many other projects that changed their lives and their communities. We are so proud of all the highest awards earned, including our 51 Bronze Awards and 33 Silver Awards.

We took two teen delegates to the National Council Session this year, providing an opportunity to see parliamentary procedure in practice on a large scale. Proposals focused on diversity, the democratic process, the Girl Scout Promise and Law, a Gold Award scholarship and more.

Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council continues to remove barriers to Girl Scouting. Last year, we served 160 girls who live in foster and kinship care, made our facilities more physically accessible and provided over \$27,000 in youth membership financial assistance. We're proud of the inclusivity of our membership and strive to create an organization where all members feel they belong.

As we prepare for a new Girl Scout year, we continue our mission to build Girl Scouts of courage, confidence and character by creating more ways to engage and support our Girl Scout family. We thank you, our incredible volunteers, Girl Scout families, supporters, donors and staff for being the catalysts for our Girl Scouts!



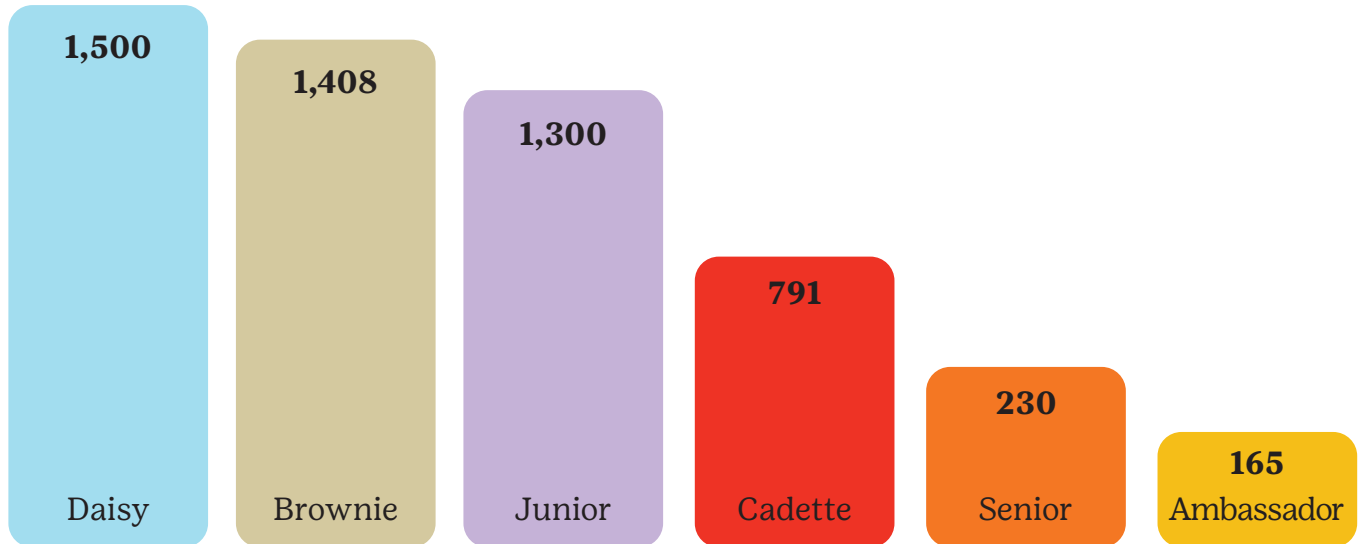

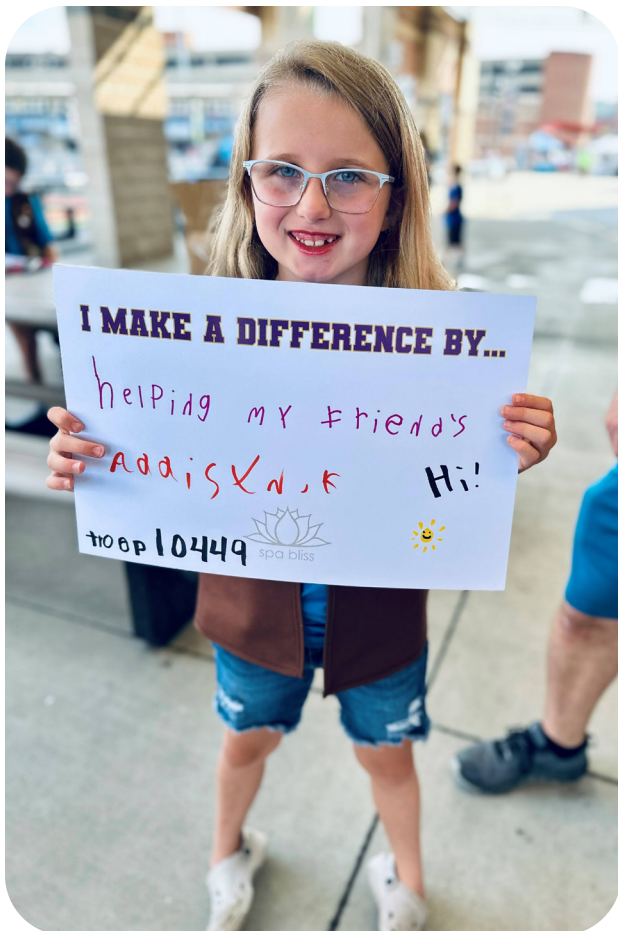

Property

The past membership year marked multiple milestones for Black Diamond Council's properties.

After facing weather challenges, updates to our **Girl Zone and Urban Camp** saw the addition of an adult-sized changing table, an accessible shower facility, adaptable seating, a kitchen for culinary arts, a teen area and more to ensure the space is accessible and exciting to all Girl Scouts.

September welcomed the grand opening of our new **MakerSpace**, which hosted our Summer Day Camp program. The space features educational activities and stations which will allow for Girl Scouts and community members to learn new and exciting skills in an engaging way.



Program



2023 saw the return of **GIRL Fest** and this year, Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council welcomed **562 participants** from **18 states** and **26 sister councils** to Ace Adventure Resort in Oak Hill, WV to scale mountains, make new friends and show their Girl Scout pride!

Other programming wins included our collaboration with Cass Scenic Railroad State Park for our **Girl Scouts Love State Parks** event. The collaboration invited **56 Girl Scouts** and **37 registered adults** to spend the day outdoors, earn their Outdoor Art Badge and explore the site with a Park Naturalist.

Partnerships with West Virginia American Water and Marshall University allowed Girl Scouts to explore new locations and gain exciting STEM skills.

Girl Scouts gained empathy and tapped into their critical thinking skills by planning donations for our 2023 council service project, **Hospital Helpers**. Through the project, troops sought to brighten the day of hospitalized children or those who are chronically ill.

Camp

Girl Scouts sought to explore new adventures at camp during the 2022-2023 membership year. This past summer saw success with our Summer Day Camp program as over 1,300 Girl Scouts and adults participated in camp programs, with 285 of those attending a camp program at one of four of our camp properties: Camp Rocky Ledges, Camp Giscowheco, the Girl Zone or the new MakerSpace.

Foster/Kinship

Out of the **5,397 Girl Scouts** we served in the 2022-2023 membership year, **160** were in foster/kinship care, making up **2.96%** of our total Girl Scout membership.

Girl Scouts of Black Diamond is offering free programming for children in foster and kinship care as part of a Benedum Foundation grant. This grant aims to build youth resiliency through character-building programs in partnership with the West Virginia Council of Churches (WVCC) for the West Virginia Foster, Adoptive and Kinship Parents Network (WVFAKPN). Girl Scouts is serving foster/kinship youth with meaningful programming and adult role models so that Black Diamond Girl Scouts can become caring, productive adults.

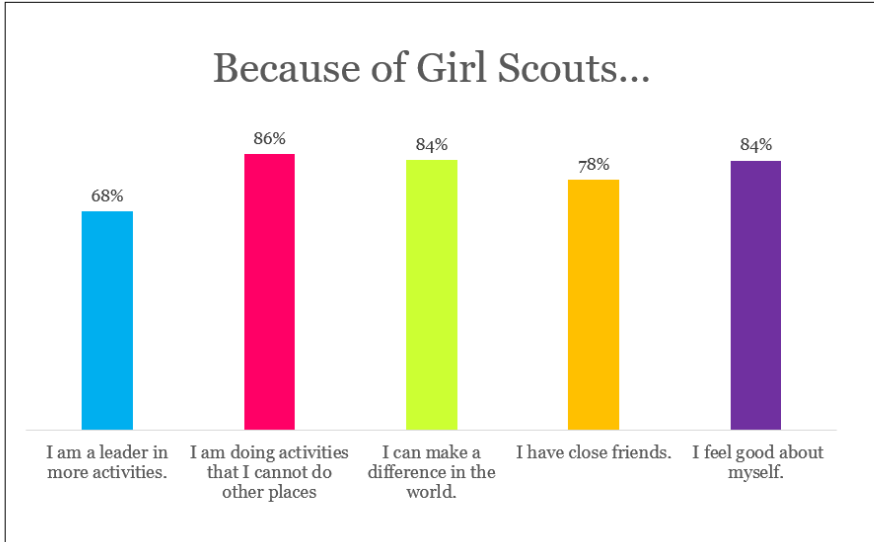


Member Satisfaction

In 2023, Black Diamond Girl Scouts and volunteers were invited to participate in the annual Girl Scouts Voices Count survey, a national survey of Girl Scouts, parents/caregivers, troop leaders and Service Unit volunteers. Data collected from these surveys is then used by GSUSA and local councils to improve national programming and help Girl Scouts grow!

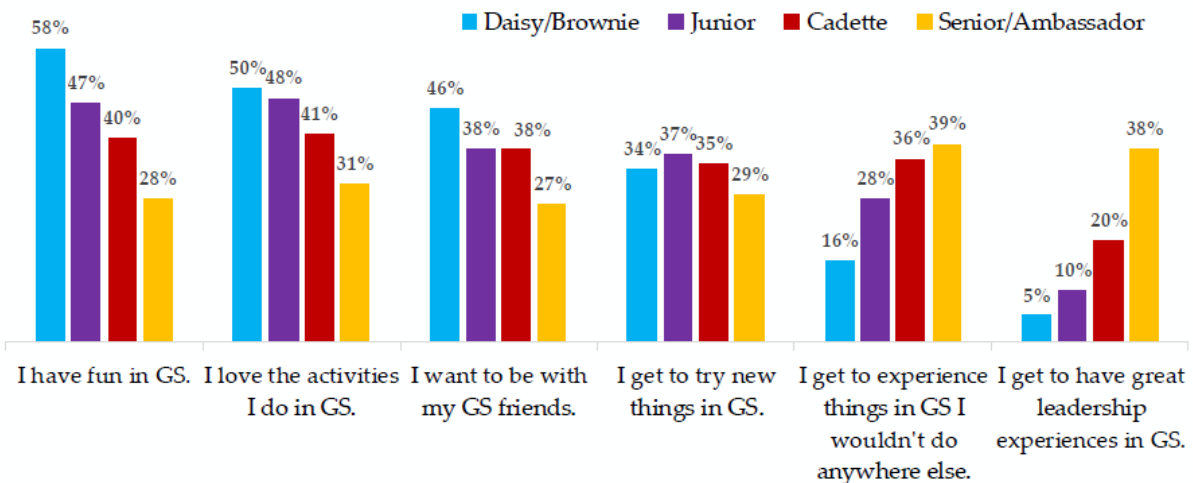
In 2023, **52.0% of our youth members said they loved being a Girl Scout**, up from **47.6%** in 2022. Additionally, **6 in 10** Black Diamond Girl Scouts said they **have a strong sense of self** and **7 in 10 have positive values**.

- **Seniors and Ambassadors** feel as though they are leaders in more activities.

Highest Awards

Girl Scouting's highest awards—the Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards—are a Girl Scout's chance to make a lasting difference in their community and in the world. Congratulations to all of the 2022-2023 highest award recipients.

Gold Award

The Girl Scout Gold Award represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting, open only to Seniors and Ambassadors. This prestigious award challenges girls to make a sustainable impact on their communities by solving community problems. Gold Award Girl Scouts are required to provide 80 hours of community service and are eligible for select scholarships as a result of earning the Gold Award. The awards program provides these young ladies with the opportunity to be an inspiration to other girls and serve as incredible examples of what it means to be a Girl Scout.

Silver Award

The Girl Scout Silver Award is the highest award that can be earned by a Girl Scout Cadette in grades 6-8. By earning this award, Girl Scouts not only strengthen their skills and abilities, they learn about their community and take action to make the world a better place! This community-based project is a minimum of 50 hours. Congratulations to our 33 Silver Award recipients.

Bronze Award

The Girl Scout Bronze Award is the highest award that can be earned by a Girl Scout Junior in grades 4-5. Earning this award shows they have made a promise to help others, improve their community and become the best they can be. This community-based project is a minimum of 20 hours. Congratulations to our 51 Bronze Award recipients.

Meet Paige, Our 2023 GSUSA Girl Scout Gold Award Scholarship Recipient

Through her project, “Your Mental Health Matters. Talk About It!” Paige addressed the importance of mental health.

To help raise awareness, Paige organized a Teen Mental Health First Aide Class, created a brochure to educate others on the importance of mental health, designed a vinyl sticker for local school students featuring the new suicide prevention hotline and planted a serenity garden to create a safe place to destress.

In July of 2023, Paige received a one-time scholarship of \$10,000 from Girl Scouts of the USA to help her in her higher education journey.

Meet Our Change-Makers

The Girl Scout Gold Award is the highest achievement in Girl Scouting. Currently, this prestigious honor is awarded to only 5.4% of eligible youth members. In the 2022-2023 membership year, **11 Black Diamond Girl Scouts** were agents of change and earned a Gold Award for their hard work. From aiming to improve homelessness in their communities to finding exciting ways to make a positive impact on the planet, the following Girl Scouts utilized their many talents to create 11 projects that pushed barriers, made a difference and created sustainable change in their neighborhoods.

Yahuana A.

Fraizer's Bottom, West Virginia

Yahuana's project "Fire Pit" sought to address a lack of accessible camping areas for local families and fellow Girl Scout troops. To complete her project, Yahuana utilized a space at the St. Albans City Park to build a fire pit and allow families and local Girl Scout Troop Leaders to teach youth about camping without having to travel far from their home.





Samantha B.

Huntington, West Virginia

Samantha's project "Live Long and Pawspurr" aimed to combat a rise of stray cats in her home community. Through her project, Samantha created a series of educational videos to share on social media and raised more than \$9,000 in sponsorships to aid in the trapping of stray and feral cats to then transport them to veterinary care - including spaying and neutering if necessary. As a result of her project, Samantha helped 150 cats.

Emily C.

Meadow Bridge, West Virginia

Emily's project "Saving OUR Pollinators" addressed a decline in the planet's bee population. Through her project, Emily researched and shared information on how communities can improve the number of pollinators in their area. She hosted three community workshops and created multiple informational pieces such as posters and pamphlets which were featured around her community. Emily also donated nine bee houses to be maintained in the years ahead.





Morgan H.

Hurricane, West Virginia

Morgan's project "Monarch Conservation Through Environmental Stewardships and Increasing Empathy Through STEM" established a pollinator garden and habitat for Monarch butterflies, which were recently upgraded from a threatened species to an endangered species. Additionally, the project sought to educate fellow Girl Scouts and community members about the Monarch's decreasing population. Morgan's pollinator garden and Monarch habitat can be found at Black Knight Municipal Park in Beckley, West Virginia.

Megan H.

Wheeling, West Virginia

Megan's project "The Reasons for Hair Loss and How Hair Donations Benefit People with Hair Loss" raised awareness about the reasons individuals may suffer from hair loss. To complete her project, Megan created pamphlets featuring information about different types of hair loss and how community members can donate their hair to organizations which create wigs for those experiencing hair loss. To help share the information she collected, Megan distributed more than 100 pamphlets to hair salons in her community.





Shaye M.

Triadelphia, West Virginia

Shaye’s project “Homeless Hope” sought to improve homelessness in her community and inspire change. Through her project, Shaye engaged her community through in-person and virtual opportunities that helped raise awareness on how residents could positively impact those experiencing homelessness. Shaye also raised nearly \$4,000 to put toward donations and supplies such as blankets, hygiene products, refillable water bottles, lotions, flashlights, batteries and more.

Calleigh M.

Bridgeport, West Virginia

Calleigh’s project “Hospice Garden Tranquility Restoration” addressed the issue of littering and a lack of resources at a nearby hospice garden. To complete her project, Calleigh initiated a dedicated volunteer program to maintain the hospice garden. She also worked to rid the area of litter, improved the green space, cleaned and fixed several birdhouses and much more to brighten the environment and create a welcoming space for her neighbors.





Kirsten R.

Kingwood, West Virginia

Kirsten’s project “Bags to Benches” sought to encourage recycling in her local area while also helping wildlife and animals both around the world and in her community. To accomplish her goal, Kirsten teamed up with fellow Girl Scouts and her classmates at Preston High to collect more than one ton of plastic film to be recycled into benches by Trex, a furniture company. Kirsten also worked with the Preston County Animal Shelter to place the benches in different animal shelters.

Danielle T.

Cross Lanes, West Virginia

Danielle’s project “Connecting Through Cards” taught people how to make handmade greeting cards from everyday objects to be sent to the elderly. Through her project, Danielle teamed up with 16 local nursing homes to receive and distribute cards to their residents. Danielle hosted both in-person and virtual card-making workshops and invited the community to participate. Eight YouTube videos and a Facebook page called “Spreading Cheer with Cards” were created so individuals far and wide could learn more about the project, see examples and find ways to get involved.





Alaina T.

Belmont, Ohio

Alaina’s project “A Touch of Glamour for Nursing Home Residents” helped lift the spirits of nearby nursing home residents. Through her project, Alaina established a group of volunteers who visited Forest Hills Healthcare and Rehabilitation twice each month to combat loneliness among residents by providing manicures and the occasional facial for those who choose to participate. Alaina also invited local students to join in her project to attain volunteer hours needed for certain graduation and college requirements.

Ellie W.

Craigsville, West Virginia

Ellie’s project “Senior Safety” addressed elder abuse by sharing statistics and information to better understand the issue, as well as information on how to prevent future instances of abuse. To complete her project, Ellie created and shared YouTube videos detailing the root cause of elder abuse and how individuals can assist in preventing it. Ellie also made posters to serve as a community outreach tool which featured a hotline number.

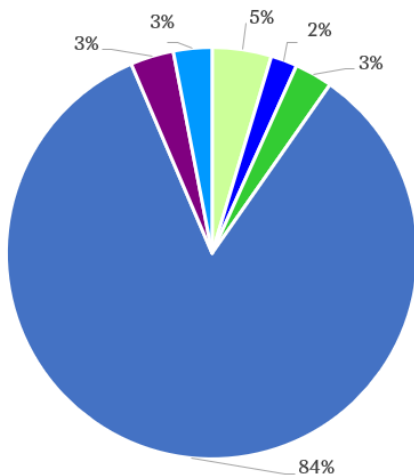

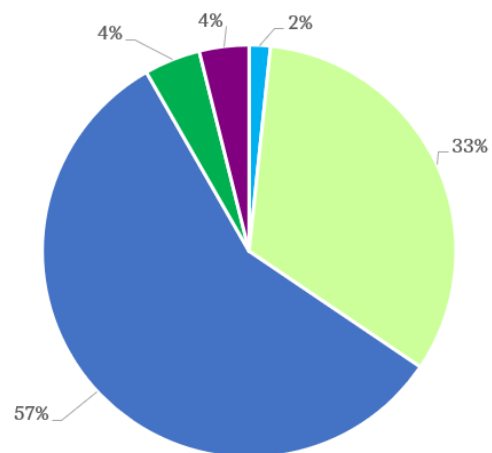
